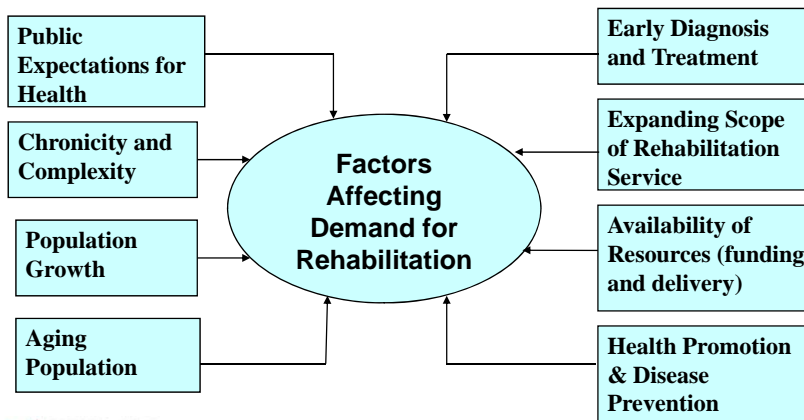

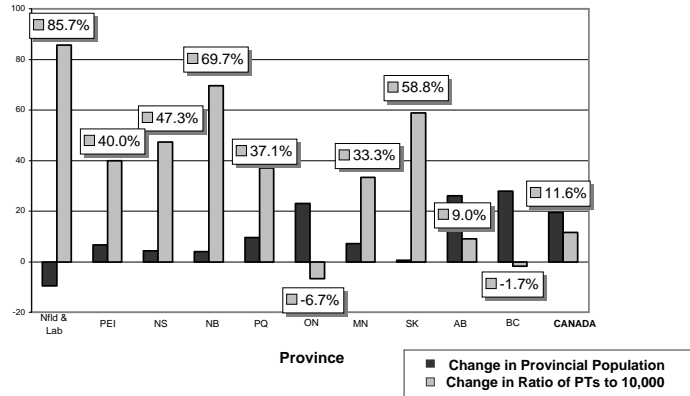
Factors that Affect Demand for Rehabilitation Service

PT to Population Ratio in Canada 1991-2005

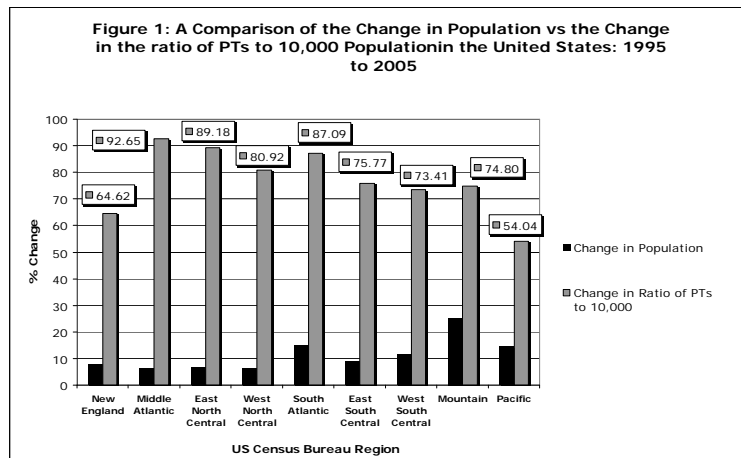
Figure 3: A Comparison of the Change in Population vs the Change in the ratio of PTs to 10,000 Population: 1991 to 2005

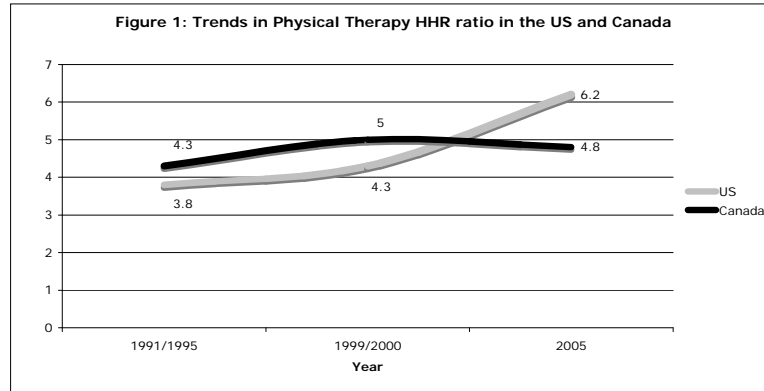
PT to Population Ratio in US 1995-2005

Figure 1: A Comparison of the Change in Population vs the Change in the ratio of PTs to 10,000 Population in the United States: 1995 to 2005

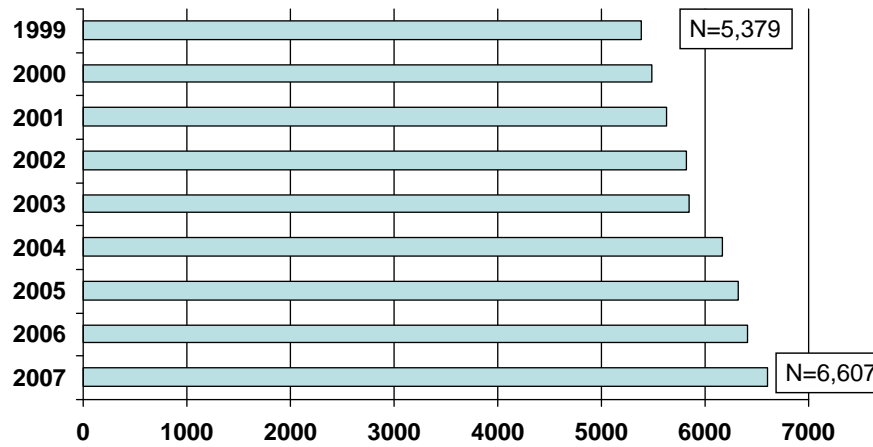

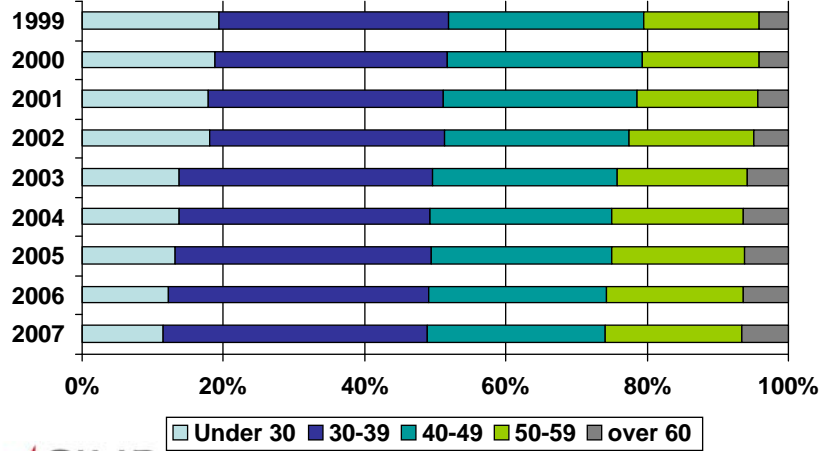

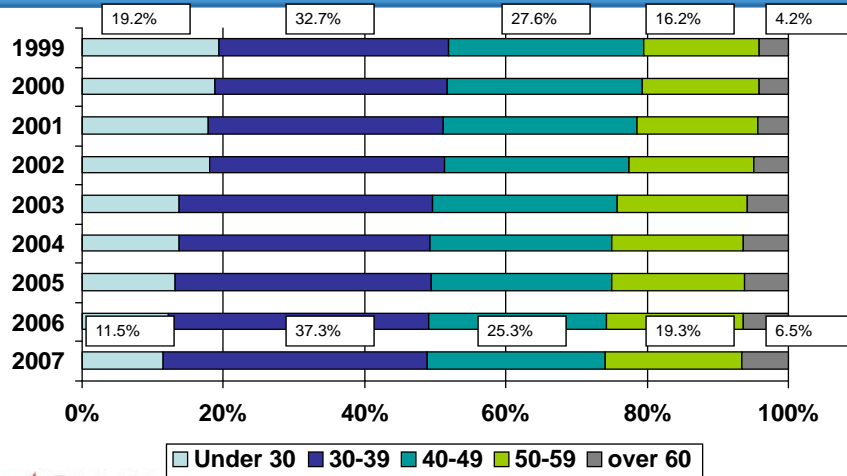
Number of PTs Practicing in Ontario 1999-2007

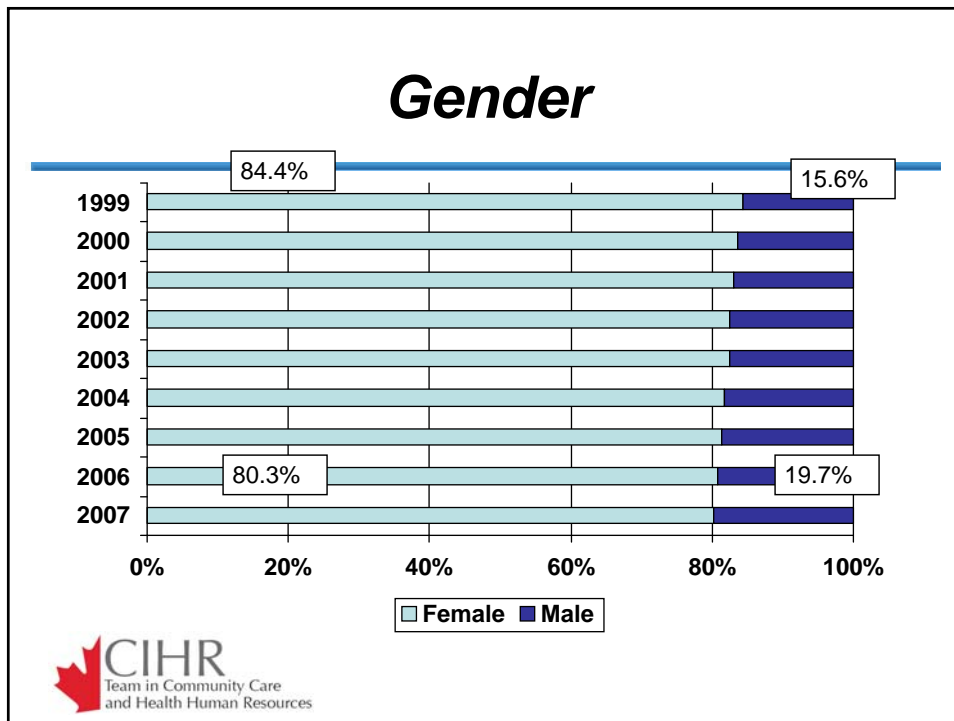
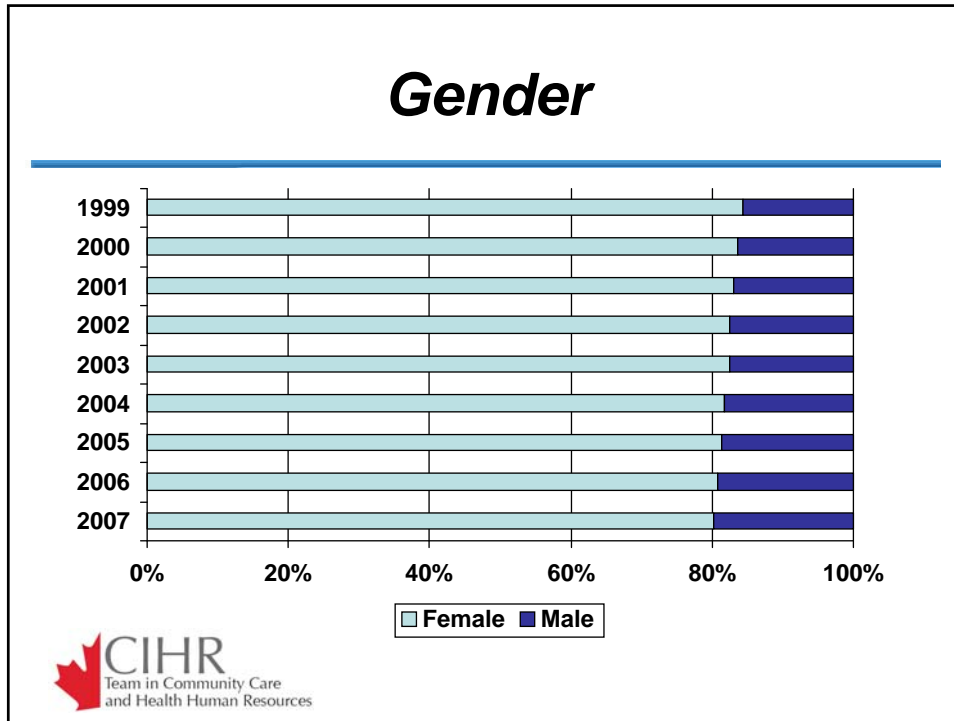


Age Distribution

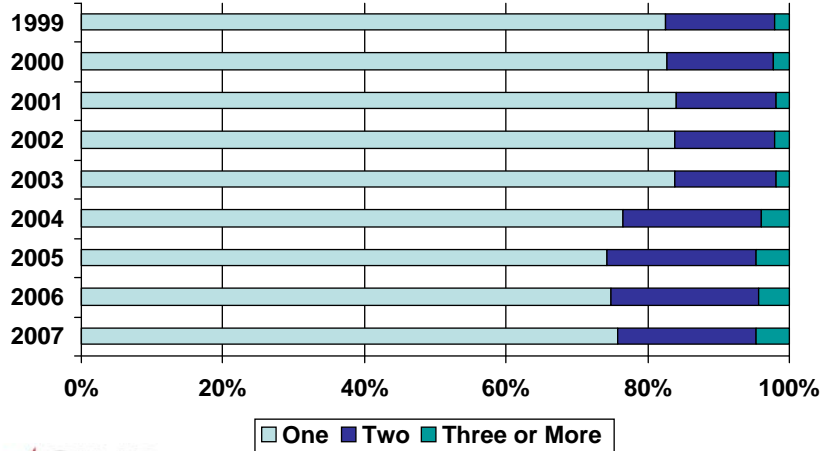

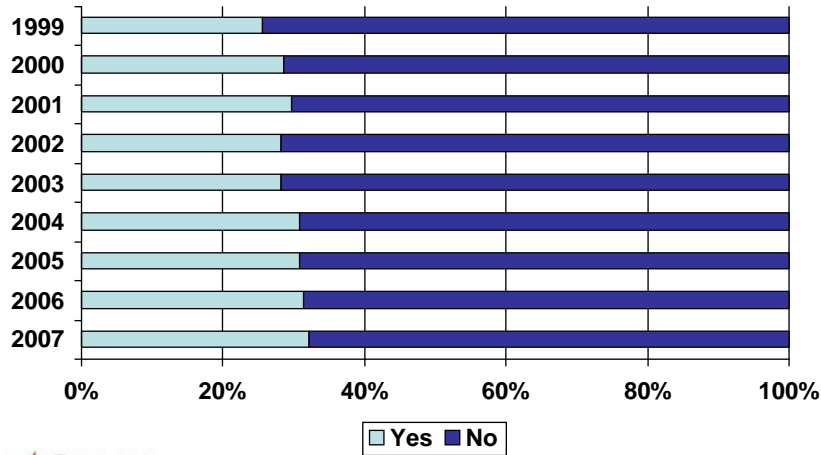




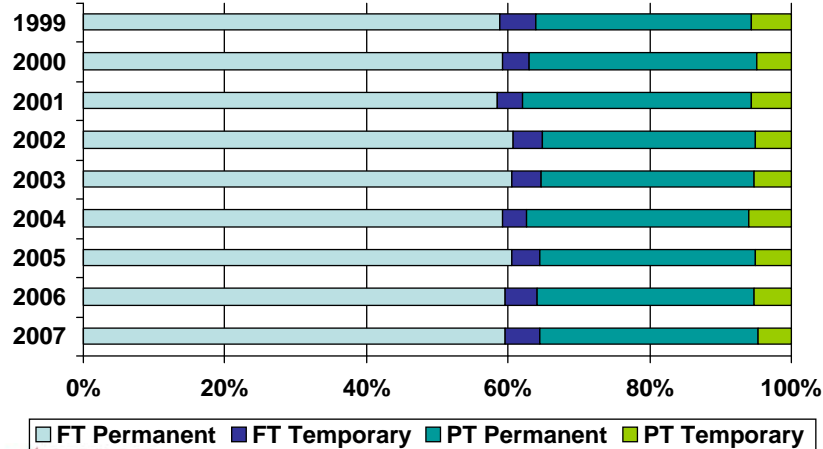
Number of Employers



Self-Employed – Primary Employer



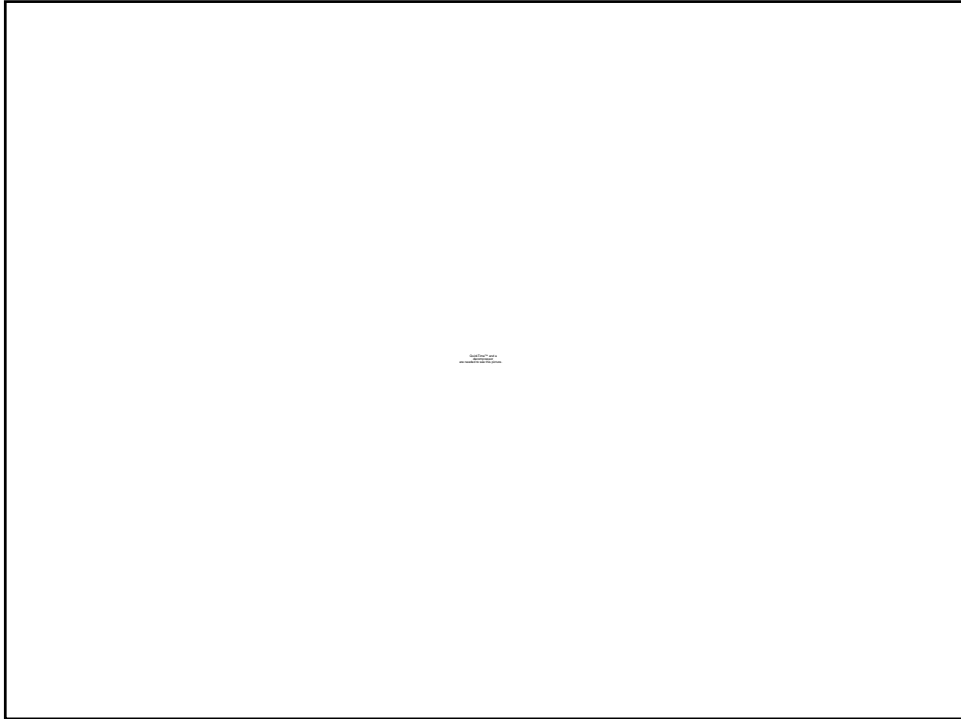

Research Plan

- Further understanding of mobility in PT
 - Survival analysis in process
- Other research questions that require attention:
 - Why are HHR not keeping pace with population growth in Ontario?
 - What factors are driving an increasing proportion of PTs within the 30-39 age category?
 - What occurred between 2003 and 2004 that appears to drive change in most of the variables of interest?
 - What are the implications of a large cohort (approx 40%) of PTs working part time?
 - What are the implications of PTs (20%) working for multiple employers?
 - Are PTs working in the same service area over time?
